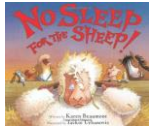


Bedtime Stories

An assortment of animals on a boat take a bath, put on their pajamas, brush their teeth before going to bed.

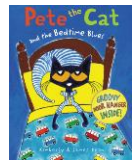
Brown, Margaret Wise. [Goodnight Moon.](#) (E BRO)

Bear has never been so tired but his next-door neighbor, a wide-awake duck, keeps disturbing his sleep.

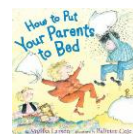


Krosoczka, Jarrett. [Naptastrophe!](#) (E KRO)

At sunset, when their work is done for the day, a crane truck, a cement mixer, and other pieces of construction equipment make their way to their resting places and go to sleep.

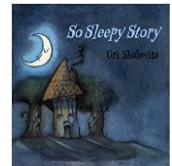


Scotton, Rob. [Russell the Sheep](#). (E SCO)

Brave Cowboy tries to sing his young calf pals to sleep on a dark, dark night, with humorous results.

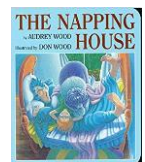


Willems, Mo. [Don't Let the Pigeon Stay Up Late!](#) (E WIL)
